Dear Chair Cantwell, Ranking Member Cruz, Chairman Graves, and Ranking Member Larsen,

The undersigned organizations write to express support for provisions focused on improving the air travel experience of passengers with disabilities in H.R. 3935, the Securing Growth and Robust Leadership in American Aviation Act, and S. 1939, the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2023. We appreciate the inclusion of a number of provisions focused on improving the safety and dignity of the air travel experience for people with disabilities, including disabled veterans, and hope they will be included in the final FAA Reauthorization bill.

Despite a focus on passengers with disabilities in the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018 (P.L. 115-254), the air travel experience of passengers with disabilities has not improved. Instead, it is often frustrating and is at worst unsafe. In 2022, the most recent year for which statistics are available, passengers filed a little over 42,300 disability-related complaints directly with over 180 foreign and domestic airlines, which was an increase of nearly 15 percent over 2018. Congress must take more decisive action to improve the safety of air travel for passengers with disabilities.

We are pleased that both the House and Senate versions of the new FAA Reauthorization include several sections focused on the problems people with disabilities frequently encounter when traveling by air. Some of these provisions include training requirements for assisting passengers with limited mobility and properly stowing assistive devices; analyzing and improving the Department of Transportation's (DOT) complaint process; addressing the need for more access standards and accessibility of inflight entertainment, as well as improved access to airline websites, applications, and information communication technologies; and increasing access to seating accommodations. The bill also requires continued study into safe and secure in-cabin wheelchair tie-down systems; and for DOT to perform a more in-depth analysis of mishandled wheelchairs as reported by airlines. Additionally, the legislation reauthorizes the Air Carrier

Access Act Advisory Committee, increases disability representation on passenger experience committees, and focuses on the needs of passengers with disabilities in evacuations.

We also support several provisions included in only one chamber's bill. Specifically, we support S. 1939's inclusion of a pilot grant program to increase airport accessibility, new requirements and training related to onboard wheelchairs, expansion of the Advanced Materials Center of Excellence to address safe and accessible air travel for passengers with disabilities, and the creation of a known service animal pilot program. We are also pleased that H.R. 3935 includes a provision focused on ensuring access for assistive devices powered by lithium-ion batteries.

Thank you for ensuring that the final version of the FAA Reauthorization Act includes these important provisions addressing the needs of air travelers with disabilities.
